

The CAFES Experimental Farm (formerly known as the Student Experimental Farm) is a two-acre farm and garden that has served as a hands-on living laboratory for Cal Poly students since 1989. In keeping with its name, it has been home to an interdisciplinary array of innovative appropriate technology projects, demonstrating everything from sustainable agriculture and horticulture to holistic management, aquaponics, alternative energy and green building. With a panoramic view of campus, it has also served as a popular meeting spot for classes, workshops and community gatherings. The farm is managed by the College of Agriculture, Food and Environmental Sciences (CAFES) and is located next to the Compost Unit off of Mount Bishop Road.

Dr. Nick Babin is an assistant professor of Agroecology in the Natural Resources Management and Environmental Sciences Department at Cal Poly. He manages the Agroecology Learning Garden located with the CAFES Experimental Farm. This garden serves as an outdoor classroom and laboratory for a variety of courses he teaches including Natural Resource Ecology, Agroecology, and Social Dimensions of Sustainable Food Systems. It is also the focal for ongoing research projects with undergraduate and MS students concerning the ecological evaluation of perennial grain and vegetable intercropping systems.

You Can Still Buy Rootstock, And It's Already Been Potted For You!

Send your purchase request to Manny: mannym25@gmail.com

Please include your full name, phone number, and type and quantity of rootstock.

Price: \$5/potted rootstock.

<u>Apple: M.7 EMLA</u> Semi-dwarf rootstock, Produces trees about 50-60% of standard. Good resistance to collar rot and fireblight and adapts well to a wide range of soil types and climates. Has a tendency to sucker.

Sweet Cherry: Prunus avium, "Mazzard"

The most-common standard-size sweet-cherry rootstock. Produces a very vigorous tree with good anchorage. Some tolerance to root fungus. Will grow on a wide range of soils.

Plum/Apricot:

Prunus Marianna 2624

Compatible with plums, apricots, some almonds. Not compatible with peaches and nectarines. Produces a semi-dwarf tree well adapted to many different soil types. Can be shallow rooted the first couple years and susceptible to leaning until established so staking may be necessary. Somewhat prone to suckering. Tolerates wet soils. Resistant to root knot nematodes, lightly resistant to phytophthora, but prone to bacterial canker.

Prunus mariana GF 8-1

Produces a standard sized tree (10 - 15 ft). Is very robust and adapts to all types of soil. Mariana produces good crops of plums, but doesn't anchor well when it is young and tends to produce root suckers. It resists root knot nematodes, root asphyxia, oak root fungus, crown gall, and prune brown line, but is susceptible to bacterial cankers.

CRFG Demonstration Orchard Workday Saturday, March 16 th , 2024

Our Orchard workday was well-attended. Nearly 30 people were there, about a third of whom arrived expressly to participate in the memorial tree planting for long-time member Jaleah Brynn.

We gathered to plant a Li Jujube tree that Jaleah's friends had purchased in her honor. They chose this unique tree as a representation of Jaleah's unique spirit. Memories were shared, Manny planted the tree, and we now have a lovely new addition to the orchard (visible to the right in the foreground).

Before and after the memorial tree planting, we spruced up the orchard:

- Mowed the orchard a few days before.
- Planted a yellow on white sapote, red jaboticaba, purple grumichama, and pitangatuba donated by Seth M.; and a guabiju donated by Jack S.
- Dozens and dozens of remaining rootstock were potted.
- The potting area was cleaned up and repopulated with the potted rootstock.
- The front fence, which some scalawag had squashed down, was repaired.
- Grafted apple varieties to the orchard's apple trees.
- Grafted persimmon varieties to the orchard's persimmon trees.
- Dead wood was pruned from some trees.
- Weeds were removed from around the younger, fenced trees.
