## September Meeting: Sage Ecological Landscapes

CRFG Co-Chair Linda introduced Todd Davidson, the owner and general manager of Sage Ecological Landscapes, a sustainable landscaping design and build service based in Los Osos.



Todd gave us some of his family history. He graduated from Cal Poly Ornamental Horticulture Department. He gave us an overview of the Display Garden, designed for clients to see plants when they are full grown.

A mistake some people make is putting plants too close together because they look small in the pot. They will spread out!



He introduced us to his wife, Rita, and Sam.

Rita Flores serves as the financial manager for the company. She generously gave CRFG attendees a 20% Off Gift Certificate good at Sage Design and Construction Departments. Thank you Rita!

Sam Morgan, the Assistant General Manager with a Materials Engineering degree from Cal Poly, led us on a tour of the garden and gave the highlights of some of the plants.



The plants Sage uses are all from the Mediterranean areas of the world and are low water users. Sage tries to find the right plant for the microclimates of San Luis Obispo County. Rita orders the plants.

Blue Agave (shown here) is cold hardy. The company also uses Blue Chalksticks because they are fire resistant.

The lion's tail plant, or Leonotis leonurus, is a native of South Africa known for its striking, whorled orange flowers that resemble a lion's tail. This fast-growing evergreen shrub attracts pollinators like hummingbirds and butterflies and is resistant to deer.


Lion's tail needs to have a third of the woody growth cut back each year to keep it looking green and lush.






By the dry creek there is a blooming Octopus Agave with a tall flower spike. Agave vilmoriniana is a species of agave endemic to Mexico that is known for its untoothed arching and twisting leaves. The flower stalk of A. vilmoriniana can reach up to 9 m high, and the plant dies after flowering. Luckily there are usually "pups' that have grown next to the flowering plant. Trying to cut off the flower stock to save the Agave does not work.

The red leaved plant in the forefront is a relative of the soft an fuzzy upright Wooly Bush. Adenanthos cuneatus, or the Coastal Jug Flower, is a spreading Australian native shrub from the south coast of Western Australia, known for its attractive silvery-grey, wedge-shaped leaves that turn bronze or pink when new.





A good plant to put under Coastal Oaks is the succulent in the genus Cotyledon. It can survive the dry summers that oaks have evolved to endure. The fallen oak leaves do not get caught in the flat Cotyledon leaves.

Be cautious if you plant Cotyledon. Cotyledon Orbiculata is reported to be toxic to pets, particularly cats and dogs. The plant contains compounds that may cause mild to moderate toxicity if ingested. Common symptoms of toxicity include vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, and, in some cases, more severe reactions.

#### Jenny's Additional Notes

#### Laboratories for analyses

Todd said one of the most important things to know about is the soil. Samples from landscape sites are sent to Wallace Laboratories in El Segundo, CA. The sample costs about \$110. Their agronomic soil testing covers pH, salinity, soluble salts, sodium, all 14 essential nutrients, and testing for toxic metals such as arsenic, cadmium, lead, and mercury at no extra cost. Their reports include recommendations and clear interpretations of results to guide you in improving soil health and plant growth.

#### **Gater Dust**

There are many products to put between flagstones such as sand, gravel, concrete or polymerics such as Gater Dust. According to Perplexity AI "Gater Dust is typically cheaper than using concrete (mortar) for filling flagstone joints, especially for small projects and joints up to 6 inches wide. Flagstone joints filled with Gater Dust require less labor, no mixing, and less material than concrete-based mortared joints, which are more labor-intensive and require both mortar and sometimes a concrete base for best results."

Gater Dust is slightly flexible and partially permeable.

#### **Gopher Control**

For control of gophers in their display garden, they use a product called Critter Maxx.

The active ingredient is Castor Oil which repels gophers, voles and moles. It does not kill them. Sage injects it into the irrigation system and therefore is applied to every plant to help protect it. Critter Maxx can also be mixed and applied by a sprayer.

Critter Maxx is made by EZ Flow Injection Systems. The product contains 10% Castor Oil and 90% water as inert Ingredient. Although the producer claims it is "100% Natural", there is no evidence or listing of Critter Maxx being registered with the CDFA State Organic Program or included in recognized organic input registries for use in certified organic crop production.
