GROWING SAPOTES ON CALIFORNIA'S CENTRAL COAST Robert and Carol Scott

Many years ago, a CRFG meeting was held at Mike Cirones white sapote orchard in Morro Bay. We tasted our first sapote (Vernon variety), it was love at first bite. We saved all the seeds from the fruit we ate that day and grew our trees. We also got seeds from the CRFG Seed Bank and started Rainbow seedlings. They were slow growing at first, without any fruit. After grafting them it still took 3 to 4 years to give us fruit. We now have 14 multi-grafted trees with 40 varieties.

White Sapote (casimiroa edulis) is a medium to large evergreen tree that is the hardiest of exotic subtropicals, it can be grown wherever oranges are grown and can take occasional frost to 22 degrees when established. (More information about sapotes can be found on Fruit Facts at CRFG.org)

In May of 2011, Robert, Jack Swords, Bob Holzinger, Harvey Correia and John Valenzuela, met with Bob Chambers at his property in De Luz to obtain scion wood from his extensive collection of over 40 varieties of sapote. The purpose was to distribute the wood so that his collection would not be lost. Bob was a longtime member of CRFG and was very generous to share his knowledge and scion wood.

4 years later, our trees are grafted and are becoming very productive. With 40+ different varieties of sapote, we have fruit ripening at different times with many unique flavors and textures; it is hard to pick a favorite. The only downside is that the fruit is fragile, so growing your own tree is the best way to obtain fruit. Contact us for seed or scion wood anytime.
